Shad Report Shad are in the system! Sacramento River — Good reports of shad as far up as Red Bluff. Better reports of numbers in the last couple days. Good shad fishing should continue for a few more weeks. Road 48 is no longer open to the public. Best access is by boat but there are many places to fish for shad from the bank around Chico. American River — More reports of shad near Goethe Park but numbers are still low. Yuba River - More shad reported around Daguerre but the majority of shad are in the Sacramento. Shad gear: Fish a sink-tip or full sinking line in type III — VI. Shad will hold in the deeper buckets in the middle of the river during the day and will move closer to shore in the morning and evening. Use a short 4' section of 8-12 lb abrasion resistant tippet material such as Maxima for a leader. Have a good selection of colors in and keep switching colors until you find one that consistently catches fish; Green Death, Pearl Death, Simmons' shad fly (chartreuse, orange), shad dart (red, chartreuse), cactus head (chartreuse, pink) in sizes #4-8.

Other Reports Lake Almanor A few hex have been spotted at dusk around Prattville and Gerital Cove. This is just the beginning! We should see more Hex in the next week and fish should be all over them until they get their fill. **Dayis Lake** Some damsels and callibaetis midday to afternoon. Walking the shore fishing for cruising trout can be good if you're in the right spot. Best access is by boat of float tube. San Joaquin (Soda Springs and Devil's Postpile are open. Fishing slower moving water with an attractor dry will rise a few fish. Look for fishing to improve with less water. Fishing will improve with reduced flows. **Butte Creek** (Butte Meadows) is slow during the heat of the day but improves dramatically with hatches of caddis stoneflies, mayflies, PED's from 5pm to dusk, High sticking nymphs through deeper runs will get a few fish around Cherry Hill campground. West Carson Flows are 59 cfs and fishing is fair to good. Fishing is best midday to dusk with some stoneflies and caddis but fish will rise all day to attractor dries. Dab a vellow humpy in pocket water. Good spot for beginners to perfect the dead drift. Feather River (Hwy 70 bridge to Gridley) A few smaller steelhead caught in the first and last two hours of light. Fish are located in riffles and tailouts morning and evening and in deeper pools during the warmest part of the day. **Baum Lake** Fishing is good with hatches of PMD's mid morning, callibaetis noon to 5pm and caddis 4pm to dusk. Fish a parachute adams and change droppers from PMD's to caddis pupas and midges to catch the most fish. Little Truckee (from Stampede to Boca Reservoir) Fishing is fair to good. Flows are coming down which is making bugs and fish more active. A few PMD's coming off mid morning to mid afternoon. Fishing a well placed stimulator will get fish to rise. Best reports are from the upper end near Stampede. Manzanita Lake (Lassen Park) Fish are actively feeding on callibaetis and caddis. Fishing a parachute adams with a copper john dropper along the bank will catch rainbows and browns. Fish are rising to caddis afternoon and evening. Dancing an elk hair caddis along the manzanita will entice browns out of the manzanita. Busy on the weekends. Best time to be there is on weekdays when there is less pressure. **Owens River** (above Crowley Lake) Fishing is good with hatches of caddis and stoneflies in the afternoon. Nymph with a copper john and rubberleg stone in the morning. Switch to a crystal stimulator or Hogan's hangin' stimi, and drift over cut banks or rising fish. Fishing should continue to improve with good flows. Stanislaus River, M.F. (below Beardsley Dam) Fishing is fair to good. Some good hatches of caddis and stoneflies coming off in the afternoon and fish are starting to key on them. For good quantities of fish, try nymphing with attractor nymphs. Work lots of water to let many fish see the flies. Fishing will continue to improve with better hatches and consistent flows. Trinity River (Fly only section below Lewiston Dam) High summer flows. Look for fishable flows and active fish around June 25th. NF Yuba (Downieville to Sierra City) Flows are good and fish are eager to take attractor dries and stonefly dries most of the day. Nymph attractors in pocket water and deeper runs for good numbers of fish. Fishing will continue to improve with more bugs hatching everyday. **Putah Creek** (below Lake Berryessa) Flows are high and fishing is tough. Find any slower water where fish will feed. Nymphing a red copper john with a zebra midge dropper will catch a few fish. Some caddis in the evening. Dancing or dead drifting a caddis will catch a few fish in the afternoon. Best fishing is just above Solano lake.

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
